Course description and objectives:

The objective of this course is to develop a rigorous understanding of key concepts and mechanisms in international trade. Among others, we will answer the following questions: Why do countries trade? Who are the winners and losers of increasing globalization? How do rms decide what and where to export? How do countries form their trade policies? We will review these and other questions through the lens of both international trade theory and real world data.

Requirements and prerequisites:

The prerequisite for this course is completion of ECON 3070: Intermediate Microeconomic Theory. It is assumed that you are comfortable with the basic concepts and mathematical tools used in microeconomics. I highly recommend reviewing your notes from microeconomics and calculus.
