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Article Presentations and Critiques, and Class Participation*:

Term Projects:

Students will be required to work in small groups (or possibly individuatly d choose a topic and examine it in a political economics or public choice setting. This leaves open artiged f subject matter from which to choose, so you must submit a **christ**ice and seconchoice topic to re by the beginning of the third week (9/) and you must have an approved topic they end of the fifth week (9/28). Your paper must emphasize traditical economy or public choice aspects of the situation you are analyzing, and should most importantly be an analytical (NOT narrative) study. No paper should be longer than 8 pages (double spaced). More details on the paper are posted on the loss trades Feel free to meet with me on a regular basis to discuss your paper.
